Pioneers Gather for the 99th Year of Pioneering

More than 500 Pioneers gathered in Atlanta, Georgia, for the Annual Meeting February 26-27, 2010. This year's theme was *Sparkign Pioneers for a New Century of Service*. The meeting opened with a welcome session and appreciation breakfast at which Immediate Past Chairman Dave Nichols welcomed new Chairman Jim Schmit. The breakfast also included a special video message from CEO of the Points of Light Institute and Co-Founder of HandsOn Network., Michelle Nunn.

Training on projects leading up to the Centennial was the main focus during the day on Saturday. Jerry Wilson, Global Chief - Customer and Commercial Office, The Coca Cola Company, shared how Coke leveraged its Centennial celebration

to promote its brand. Attendees also received an overview of Pioneer Centennial goals and objectives.

At the service project, Pioneers packed more than 500 comfort kits for military personnel. They learned how to make no-sew lap blankets and folded pocket flags to be placed in the boxes. Pioneers, friends and family were pleased that all the care packages were going to someone that a Pioneer or friend knew.

The weekend culminated with a banquet, dinner, dancing, and a video introduction to the 2011 Centennial Celebration in Boston.

Pioneers Leaders Prepare for 2011 Centennial Year

Since 1911, Pioneers has grown from 734 members to more than 620,000 and have given hundreds of millions of volunteer hours to our communities.

Now we are preparing for an exciting 2011 Centennial Year with 3 Centennial project opportunities. First, *Pioneers Volunteer Community Grant Program - Sparkign Local Partnerships* is an opportunity for units to work with their local government officials and sponsor companies to designate a certain number of volunteer hours for a community in need and request grant funding from International Headquarters for up to \$50,000.

Second, *Projects in a Box* helps units participate in one of three familiar but newly branded projects (1) *Pioneers Environmental Initiative - Sparkign a Clean, Green Planet* (2) *Pioneers Literacy Project - Sparkign the Love of Reading* and (3) *Pioneers Military Mission - Sparkign Support for Soldiers and their Families*. If a unit chooses either of these two Centennial projects, it will receive special project and collateral materials for minimal or no cost. You may also choose and plan your own project. Reach out to your unit leadership to see how your respective unit might be participating.

Volunteers Recognized for Half Century of Service

2010 marks 50 years of service for the Talking Book Repair program. Through the Library of Congress, The National Library Service uses this program to help people with visual and/or physical impairments. Pioneers have helped by repairing the LP and cassette players used in the program.

F. Kurt Cylke, Director, National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped Library of Congress, wrote the following to volunteers, *"I congratulate the Pioneers for fifty years of service to the blind and physically handicapped library community. Across the country, you use expert knowledge to repair thousands of talking-book machines on a volunteer basis, an effort totaling nearly \$20 million dollars worth of labor every year. Without your dedication, it would be all but impossible for NLS to keep enough talking-book machines in service for more than 800,000 eligible readers."*

At the Pioneers Awards Ceremony, the U.S. Pioneers were awarded a congratulatory letter from the President, a certificate and Presidents Volunteer Service Award pin.

Although Canadian Pioneers have switched to digital and no longer work on repairing cassette machines, 2010 would have been Canada's 40 year anniversary of volunteering on the program.

Computers for Schools Wins International Award

Created by Canadian Pioneers and Industry Canada in 1993, now operating in every province and territory, and supported by Pioneers chapters coast to coast, Computers for Schools (CFS) is a one in a million program. In reclaiming, refurbishing, and returning used business computers to service at Canadian schools, libraries, other nonprofit educational organizations - some 100,000 annually - the program has become a source of national pride and a model for other nations to follow.

At current production levels, the international, multiple award-winning program will reach the 1 million computers milestone as early as 2010. Behind that incredible achievement are some equally startling numbers: 52 millions pounds of electronic waste diverted from Canadas landfills; millions of dollars in savings to taxpayers and schools (the CFS cost-benefit ratio is 10:1); hundreds of thousands of community service hours by thousands of Pioneers; a partnership that has grown to include 125 corporate entities; and hands-on work experience for over 10,000 Canadian youth. In addition, 14 other countries have similar programs in operation, and every country in the Americas and the Caribbean now has a computer-recycling business plan in place.
